SERMON NOTES FROM PASTOR JONATHAN

Matthew 23:37b - Jesus Says: "How often have I desired to gather your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings, and you were not willing!"

hroughout scripture we have many images for God including this image of God as parent, as mother, as a mother hen. You will notice this image in many hymns. "Thy Holy Wings" has a few lines that relate to this image of God as a mother hen: "Thy holy wings, O savior, spread gently over me, and let me rest securely through good and ill in thee." & "Oh, let me nestle near thee, within thy downy breast where I will find sweet comfort and peace within thy nest. Oh, close thy wings around me and keep me safely there, for I am but a newborn and need thy tender care." Another hymn in our hymnal speaks of this image of God as a mother hen too: "Mothering God, you gave me birth."; It reads "Mothering Christ you took my form, offering me your food of light, grain of life, and grape of love." & "Mothering Spirit, nurturing one, in arms of patience hold me close." And the last hymn I thought of is one that we don't know well because it's in our new hymnal supplement has the lyrics: "As a mother comforts her child, so God will comfort you. As a hen gathers her brood, so Christ will gather you. As a wise one counsels her friend, so the Spirit will counsel you. The Trinity of love will be with you."

It's a prominent thought among those that study theology that many people's ideas and images of God are found more in the hymns and music that we know than directly from scripture. The words we say and sing are important, give us images and ideas about God, and I'm grateful that many of the hymns we sing are soundly based in scripture. It's a reason we have hymnals with hymns selected by musicians, teachers, and scholars – and a reason we continue to have new hymnals that continue to provide expansive, faithful, and biblical images of God.

This image of God we have today as a mother hen, as a mother is present in our hymns and in our Gospel reading today, but versions of this same image can be found throughout the bible: in Isaiah as God's children are gathered beneath God's unwavering love; in Deuteronomy as God is compared to an eagle that stirs up her nest; in Ruth and the Psalms where Israel finds shelter under God's wings; in Paul's writing where signs of God's Kingdom are compared to birth-pangs of a new creation (those are some mighty kicks); and even Genesis as the Spirit of God brooded over the waters

and hovered over the face of the deep at the dawn of creation. This image of Jesus, of God as a mother hen, a mothering bird over her nest, a mother is deeply biblical and tied to our faith. However, it may not be the first image of God we think of. Yes, of course, we know God as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit – but God is so much more than that. The diversity of ways we can imagine and how God is shown to us is important – and so is this image that Jesus uses for himself as a mother, and specifically a mother hen. Our God comes to us as a mother hen. What does that look like? How does that feel? What does that mean for us as God's people?

Well, I'll turn you back to our hymns for a moment, because I think the hymn writers had some interesting ideas. In thinking about God as a mother hen, they were brought to an understanding that God provides us secure rest, sweet comfort, peace, safety, tender care. They were reminded that God gave us birth; created us all; offers us food in the forms of light, grain, grape, and more; and surrounds us with nurturing care and patience. This just expands our understanding of God even further. This lets us imagine God's love in different ways, furthering God's love for us. Because yes, many people quickly think of God as father, speaking to Jesus from above with a deep voice – this is my child, my beloved. As we read the prayers, the creed, and more. we may be reminded that God loves us as father. But that doesn't provide the whole picture for the expansive, abundant love of God. God loves us as mother as well. God loves us in more ways than we can possibly imagine. And each time we find a different way to think about God, to imagine God, we can deepen our understanding and relationship with God just a little bit more, we can experience the love God has for us even more.

And so, we think of our God as a chicken tending her chicks, as a mother, nurturing her children. I wonder how this image of God helps us to imagine God's love for us, and for all people – how it is uniquely like a mother's love. I wonder how that opens new ways for you to understand and relate to God. I wonder how that allows you to deepen your relationship with God. Our mothering God hold us, nurtures us, comforts us, and so much more. I wonder how remembering this faithful, biblical image of God opens new opportunities to share God's nurturing, motherly love with those we encounter in our walks of life, as God hold's us tightly and warmly in those expansive, motherly wings.

CORINNE'S CUPBOARD

This year during Lent we are again collecting food items for the Snack Pack Program started by Corinne Sakala years ago.

Many Bergen County school children who receive free or reduced priced school meals are left without adequate nutrition on the weekends and during holiday breaks. The program helps to fill this void by providing healthy, kid-friendly foods to these children. The snack packs are discreetly given to these kids by the classroom teacher on Friday afternoons or before school breaks.

We will collect the following food items for the Snack Packs:

Nutri-Grain Snack Bars – 1.3 oz. (no chocolate or nuts)

2% Milk Boxes – 8 oz., non-flavored, shelf stable

Chef Boyardee Microwavable Bowls - 7.5 oz.

100% Juice Boxes – 6.75 oz.

Cold Cereal Boxes – 1 oz. individual serving size

Macaroni & Cheese - 7.25 oz. boxes

At the end of Lent, we will assemble the items in bags and deliver them to the Center For Food Action who will then deliver them to the Bergen County schools in the program. Last year we assembled 250 bags!
