In this account, Christians see a foreshadowing of our baptism into Christ: "And baptism, which [God's rescue of Noah and his family] prefigured, now saves you …" (1 Peter 3:21, NRSV).

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## **SERMON NOTES FROM PASTOR JONATHAN**



Luke 2:41-52

e often spend the season of Christmas, and especially the Sunday after Christmas, looking at the very few passages of scripture we have about Jesus' childhood and life before his Earthly ministry seemed to "officially" begin.

And this particular reading assigned for the 1st Sunday after Christmas this year, the story of the boy, Jesus staying behind at the temple and worrying his Earthly parents, fits into the idea of Christmas so well – that Jesus came to us as a human. God chose to live among us as a human, and today's Gospel reading contains a very human story that we can relate to.

Mary, Joseph, and Jesus traveled to Jerusalem when Jesus was 12 years old to attend the festival of Passover – a central religious holiday for the Jewish people. I know personally that I traveled a lot this past week, so I can definitely relate to this part of the story.

But they traveled to Jerusalem, attended the festival, and then on the way back home, they hit traffic and plane delays. No, but as they were walking home, Mary and Joseph realize that Jesus is not with them, they start to worry, and turn around to find him. I can think of many similar stories to this in my life where a child is missing and then is found.

Jesus' situation was similar, but also uniquely different. Mary, Joseph, and Jesus were traveling with a caravan of people heading back and forth to Jerusalem for the festival. It was likely that many of the children were gathered together playing with one another so that it would have been easy to not immediately notice that Jesus wasn't there.

It is almost certain that this was also a dangerous journey. The likely route they would have taken was through the Wadi Kelt – a ravine hundreds of feet deep (not as big as the Grand Canyon) that for generations would have been the traveling path towards Jerusalem. People would walk along the bottom of this ravine, or canyon, or valley – whatever you want to call it – to be protected from the hot son as they traveled.

However, there also were little caves and crevasses throughout this ravine where bandits or thieves would lay in wait for those traveling alone. This particular path is one that scholars say Jesus would have referred to in his parable of the Good Samaritan (maybe because of this instance and his parents concern), and also could be the place imagined in the 23rd psalm – the darkest valley or the valley of the shadow of death.

So, we can see that it would have been easy for Jesus' earthly parents to be worried and concerned and to rush back to Jerusalem. After searching everywhere, they find Jesus at the temple, and I imagine it went something like this.

Mary and Joseph said to Jesus: "You had us so worried. Jesus Christ, where were you?!? No really, Jesus, Christ, where were you!" Jesus replied: "No worries, I was just spending the weekend at Dad's place." Thankful that Jesus was safe but maybe also rolling their eyes, Mary and Joseph hug Jesus, give thanks for his safety, and head on their way back home with the next caravan.

I think this story if perfect for the Christmas season because it relates to such a central theme of Christmas: Emmanuel, God with Us.

We can see God's presence with worried parents when they need comfort, with community that seeks to help when a child is missing, and in thanksgiving when a child is found. But also, with Jesus, literally God-with-us, we trust that God knows the walk of the human life firsthand and can to relate to us where we are.

In this simple story of Jesus as a lost child, we can trust in this truth that God knows the walk of life. God even knows what it's like to be scolded by parents for being lost. God can relate to us in these everyday human experiences and desires to be alongside us in all of them.

God is with us in our worries and concerns as well as our thanksgivings. God is with us when there is danger and when there is safety. God is with us in the miracles and in the everyday. That is the miracle of Christmas, that God is with us, alongside us, and understands us in everything we do and are – comforting us, guiding us and loving us.

So, we continue to celebrate Emmanuel, God-with-us in this season of Christmas and far beyond. Trust that God is truly with you especially in your most deeply human moments and simple shared experiences. God is with you. Emmanuel.

## **MLK ON WHAT REALLY MATTERS**

Exactly two months before his assassination, Martin Luther King Jr. preached his final sermon at Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta. On February 4, 1968, the civil-rights icon spoke about how he wanted to be remembered at his funeral. He preferred that people recall not his education or achievements but that he "tried to give his life serving others" and "tried to love somebody."

Adapting a 1952 homily by J. Wallace Hamilton, King decried the "drum major instinct — a desire to be out front, a desire to lead the parade." Humans often want to be great and first, as evidenced by the disciples James and John requesting prime seats in paradise. But King urged listeners to focus on the "reordered priorities" of Jesus, who wants us to "be first in love."

As Jesus showed, "everybody can serve," King said. Your background or status doesn't matter, as long as you have "a heart full of grace" and "a soul generated by love."
