# **SERMON NOTES FROM PASTOR JONATHAN**



he song of Simeon, is also called in Latin, the "Nunc Dimittis" literally meaning "Now you let depart." This scriptural song occurred when Jesus was presented at the temple for a rite of ritual purification, which is traditionally understood to have happened forty days after Jesus' birth following the Old Testament patterns and laws.

On this day Mary and Joseph took Jesus to the temple for this holy tradition, but encounter these two people: Simeon and Anna. Simeon was a devout follower of God who was filled with the Holy Spirit. He had been guided by the spirit to know that he would see the Messiah in his lifetime, and Anna was a prophet of God who praised God for the redemption we would know through Christ — a prophet and preacher called by God when Jesus was just a young child. Two important people, called by God to share Gods word of grace and love.

When Simeon realized that this was indeed the Messiah, a child less that 2 months old, he sang this song to God: "Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the gentiles and for glory to your people Israel." Simeon sings to God in the presence of infant Jesus, Mary and Joseph that this little one would be the salvation of all people — not just the Jewish people, but also a light for the gentiles, the non-Jewish people of the world. This child was to be the savior of all people.

This is a song of joy, of hope, of promise — a song that God has done great things in this world and promises

salvation to us, and that our God is a God of all people, not just a small subset be it a family, an ethnic group, a country, but the whole world. God's love is for all of humanity and all of creation — God's love and God's mercy is for all people, just as God's call to love others is for all people, especially those who suffer and fear most in our world. This is a song that can still speak to us today, reminding us that God's love is for the diversity of creation. It is a calling and reminder that God's love is for all, far beyond any door or barrier.

Simeon was instructed by the Holy Spirit that he was going to meet the Messiah, the savior, the lord of lords, Jesus before he died — but we don't know when he was told that prophecy. How many years did he wait for this moment? How did he prepare to meet the Messiah? Did he go to the temple to pray every day just in case this was the day? I like to imagine that he was waiting for much of his life — maybe at least 30 years with this knowledge. He knew he was going to meet the Messiah, and waited every day knowing it was going to be the most important thing he would ever be a part of. And then this miraculous day happened. What did he do next? "You are dismissing your servant in peace." He knew he had fulfilled his lifelong wish, dream, and goal and finally met the Messiah as God had promised him. He finally was finished and felt he was dismissed from this duty. But I wonder what he did next. What would you do in preparation to meet the Messiah, the Lord? What would you do after this miraculous moment? In many ways, I like to think the answer is the same for Simeon, both before that day and after, and that the answer is the same for us too, whether in preparation or after we experience God in our lives: We give thanks to God; we pray that we might experience God's presence this day; and we seek the ways to become closer

Yes, as Christians, I think we are called to live like Simeon constantly looking for the Messiah, the Lord. We are called to look for the Messiah in the faces of everyone we meet, knowing that they too were made in God's image no matter how similar or different they are from us. We are called to look for the Messiah as we share a word of hope, of mercy, of love without bounds especially with those grieving, hurting or fearful. We are called to constantly look for the Messiah because God is present and at work in our world and in our lives. We are dismissed in peace but when we do leave today, we are dismissed in peace, with God's peace on our hearts so we can share God's love with all people.





### **CORINNE'S CUPBOARD**

This year during Lent we are again collecting food items for the Snack Pack Program started by Corinne Sakala years ago.

Many Bergen County school children who receive free or reduced priced school meals are left without adequate nutrition on the weekends and during holiday breaks. The program helps to fill this void by providing healthy, kid-friendly foods to these children. The snack packs are discreetly given to these kids by the classroom teacher on Friday afternoons or before school breaks.

We will collect the following food items for the Snack Packs:

Nutri-Grain Snack Bars – 1.3 oz. (no chocolate or nuts)

2% Milk Boxes – 8 oz., non-flavored, shelf stable

Chef Boyardee Microwavable Bowls - 7.5 oz.





**100%** Juice Boxes – 6.75 oz.

**Cold Cereal Boxes** – 1 oz. individual serving size

Macaroni & Cheese - 7.25 oz. boxes



At the end of Lent, we will assemble the items in bags and deliver them to the Center For Food Action who will then deliver them to the Bergen County schools in the program. Last year we assembled 250 bags!

### THE LENTEN DESERT

During the Lenten season, which begins on Ash Wednesday (March 5 this year), Christians figuratively follow Jesus into the desert. Just as our Savior spent 40 days fasting and facing temptation, we focus on self-reflection and contrition.

In an 1873 hymn, Claudia Hernaman wrote, "O Lord, throughout these forty days, you prayed and kept the fast. Inspire repentance for our sin, and free us from our past."

The desert experience of Lent serves a clear purpose, filling us up rather than depleting us. "This is what Lent is meant to be," writes theologian Ron Rolheiser. "Time in the desert to courageously face the chaos and the demons within us and to let God do battle with them through us. The result is that we are purified, made ready, so the intoxicating joy of Easter might then bind us more closely to God and each other."
